TO HEAL:

Over the next several months I would like to explain how we came up with those four words in our Post Slogan: To Heal, Serve, Love, and Listen. So I will take one at a time each month for the next four months.

On a personal level, this mission, I will call it, is very important and, at the same time, extremely difficult for me to talk about.

I am what some people call a cradle Catholic. Baptized at the ripe old age of about five days old, thirteen years of formal Catholic education, nine year, K through 8 by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet and four years in the seminary by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate. In the course of my life I have received all seven Sacraments.

In the early 70s I was ordained a permanent deacon. About ten years later, due to circumstances which I will not go into here, I resigned. I felt that the diocese, the church as a whole just threw me away as if I were a piece of trash. When I needed help, when I needed someone to talk to, when I needed some understanding, NO ONE was there. There are no words that could adequately explain the pain, emotionally and mental. I quit going to Mass and quit having anything to do with the church as a whole. I now call it a twenty year sabbatical. Luckily I was transferred to Las Vegas to work at the Nuclear Test Site.

I say luckily because out there, in the middle of the desert with mountains surrounding me, I could work on one of our weather stations up in the mountains and be alone, just me and God. I may have left the church, but never my undying love for God! For ten years I stayed away, ten long years.

After moving back to Missouri, every day I would pray to God for some sort of a sign if He wanted me back in His church. That sign came, and, somehow He managed to send people to me who had the understanding, love, and

encouragement to help me come back. They understood the pain and anguish I was going through.

He sent me the fantastic Mercedarian Missionaries of Berriz, whom I now call my Sister sisters. Through their love and understanding and support I came back. While there is still some of the hurt and pain left, and it probably will be with me the rest of my life, no one can ever forget.

So, when we formed out post, one of the objectives was for the post was to reach out to those veterans who, as I think of them, may be boarder line Catholic. Those who, for some reason, have been hurt through the church, be it by a priest, bishop, people in a parish, or whatever. We hold out our hand in understanding, ready to welcome them into our post, no questions asked. And, through our love, understanding and prayers, be it the will of God, they return, if it be only through our post, we will be happy. Because we can say we have been there and we understand. After all, we are the CATHOLIC War Veterans of the USA.

Jesus did not come to earth, taking the form of a human, suffering all the day to day trials we all go through. When he stubbed His toe it hurt, when a bug bit Him it itched, when His friends abandoned Him and denied knowing him, He hurt, he hurt emotionally and mentally. But, through it all, even through being killed, He forgave, He healed, He loved, He listened. Can we do anything less? He never refused to hold out His hands to help someone in need, to refuse to heal anyone needing healing, be it physical, mental, or emotional. Can we do anything less?

Blue Star Banner Ceremony

Back in 1917, Army Captain Robert Queissner wanted to make a simple flag that signified his two sons' service in World War I. Only three days later, the American War Mothers organization formed and began displaying Captain Queissner's flag in their windows. Sometimes the flags may have two or three stars (signifying two or three children serving in the military). Because so many military lives were lost in World War I, a new flag was developed. Mothers who had lost their sons in World War I began sewing a gold star over the blue star. The flag symbolized pride, love, and hope and became very popular during World War II. It returned to popularity during the Gulf War.

Our post will be conducting a Blue Star Banner ceremony on May 20th, 2017 at our post home. During the ceremony we will be presenting Blue Star Banners to those present who have family members in our military service.
